The mission of Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. (MGC), is to provide leadership in education, resources, and networking opportunities for its members to promote the love of gardening, floral design, landscape design, and civic and environmental responsibility. MGC members are also members of Central Region Garden Clubs, Inc., and National Garden Clubs, Inc.

The members of Michigan Garden Clubs provide services to our communities in a variety of ways. From planting and maintaining community gardens, to supporting programs and activities including partnering with Homegrown National Park, Michigan trail organizations, such as the Kal Haven Trail, Kalamazoo Nature Center Southwest Michigan Land Conservancy, Pierce Cedar Creek Institute, and other Michigan nature centers, conservatories, preserves, botanic gardens and arboretums. Every year our clubs provide thousands of volunteer hours and dollars. MGC donates over \$21,000 in scholarships to Michigan universities for students pursuing related studies and provides financial support for the Loda Lake Wildflower Sanctuary, maintained by the U.S. National Forest Service in Manistee National Forest (the only wildflower sanctuary in the U.S.). Michigan pollinators are at risk and of special interest to the MGC.

An all-volunteer organization, MGC provides many educational programs and courses in gardening, flower arranging, landscape design, and environmental studies throughout Michigan. Many members of Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. are Accredited Flower Show Judges, Consultants in horticulture, gardening, landscape design, the environment, and some are Extension Master Gardeners.

STANDING RULES

No Delegate shall speak in debate more than twice on the same question or longer than two minutes unless a motion is made to suspend the rules to allow him/her to speak two more minutes, seconded and passed by a majority of the voting delegates.

Notices for announcements at the Annual Membership Meeting shall be in writing and signed. Assigned Pages will pass notes and messages to the Presiding Chair.

All cellular phones/electronic devices must remain turned OFF during ALL Conference functions.


As Garden Club members, it is the hope of the Planning Committee that you take this opportunity to connect with other Garden Club members and to learn from the profes-




Visit the Gardens of 2B!

Welcome to 2B!

Our 2B district is the only district without direct access to a Great Lake. We are located in the middle bottom of the palm of the Lower Peninsula. Our district forms a giant C shape. The gardens of the 2B are a product of love, artistry, hard work and dedication from our members

We partner with our towns and cities to multiply our efforts beautifying, inspiring and educating our citizens and visitors. We invite you to stop, visit and enjoy one or more of our gardens on your drive home or on another visit to our district. So remember to "Visit the Gardens of 2B!" A selection of our 2B club gardens are discussed by club alphabetically below.



Brighton Garden Club



The Brighton Garden Club maintains gardens surrounding the Brighton Community center and brick planter boxes in downtown Brighton. The Main Street Pocket park has several large contemporary metal sculptures amongst the raised garden beds. The Post Office garden is home to the Blue and Gold Star Memorial. This is a constantly evolving garden planted with native perennials, shrubs, herbs and annuals for local migratory birds and insects. This garden in 2019 received first place Pollinator and Civic Beautification awards. The award winning Memorial garden at the Mill pond in downtown Brighton honors area veterans and their families and features two Rosie the Riveter rose bushes to honor local women working on the home front in World War II. The Victory garden has been recently updated to create a peaceful and welcoming space and includes a pergola. The garden is filled with drought tolerant, full sun and low maintenance plants The vegetables grown are donated to the food pantry. The Library gardens start with "Art the

Tiger" which is a large statue in one bed, a butterfly garden that is a certified Monarch Waystation, and a dedicated Hummingbird garden. A Peace Pole Bird House and a Commemorative pathway are also feature hese seven gardens even have an area certified as Wildlife Habitat. Their purpose is to create a learning environment and enjoyable setting for programs and quiet contemplation.

At the Michigan Humane Society of Livingston County gardens are dotted with animal statuary accenting the beautiful plantings created for the purpose of decreasing stress for those that work or visit here. The Welcoming Garden starts with large flower pots and a beautiful array of planted annuals and perennials that continue on to the Serenity Path and Reflection Garden which is a place to remember pet family members that have passed on. By the pond, the Memorial garden has become a wonderful pollinator garden for bees and butterflies.

DeWitt Millennium Garden Club

As you head north on DeWitt Road, you should park on the right before the bridge and tour Memorial park where the Dewitt Millennium Garden club maintains the colorful Memorial garden and lovely Gazebo gardens overlooking the Looking Glass River. If your group has children, they would enjoy the playground near the parking area with the cheery floral beds nearby. As you continue to drive north, you will pass the colorful planters lining the bridge and decorating the downtown. Proceed to the cemetery on your right. There you will find contemplative sites to explore within the Labryrinth garden, Blue Star Memorial garden and by following the brick walkway through the Healing garden.

The Garden Club of Greater Lansing



Scott Sunken Garden sits just south of downtown surrounded by a factory, a river and a highway. Amid all of this concrete and noise, it is a quiet oasis offering tranquility and peace. This garden was recently relocated and underwent a transformation from a shaded serene little gem to a sunny, exuberant, colorful jewel. Scott Sunken garden received a Landscape Design Award In 2021! You will find parking in the lot at the end of Capitol street. Our Blue Star Memorial is in Frances Park across from the Pavilion.

This garden is a reminder to all of us of the service members, their families and friends who have sacrificed for the safety of our freedoms. The garden is planted in reds, whites and blues to further emphasize the importance of those families who have lost loved ones during war times. This garden will be redesigned in 2022.

Grand Ledge Garden Club

When you visit the island in Grand Ledge, you will find the Blue Star memorial garden located near the entrance and garden beds at the entrance to the island bridge maintained by the Grand Ledge Garden Club. Their well maintained gardens around the Grand Ledge museum are magical. Referred to as the "Magic garden", this garden specializes in herbs that were popular in gardens during the Victorian era from 1837 to 1901. On rare moonlit nights, tours are offered to visit the garden and see how some of the herb plants are luminous! There are tales of fairies seen among these plants making this a very special garden.

Hartland Home and Garden Club



Flowers maintained by the Hartland Home and Garden Club will greet you as you enter downtown. The Blue Star memorial is found in the Hartland Cemetery and is a peaceful place. Just north of town is the Cromaine Library where most of the club's efforts are centered. The library grounds were recently transformed from a shade garden to vibrant and sunny garden space and rededicated in 2021. The garden focuses on native plants to promote our native pollinators. Memorial bricks dedicated by community members form a meandering walkway through the upper garden. So be sure to come by and see how their garden grows!

Howell Garden Club



Our Blue Star Memorial Garden started as an island in the middle of city hall parking lot with a large boulder for the plaque and big empty containers approaching the building. It's evolved to include many types of colorful perennial and annual flowers with native plants, too. It is now a beautiful pollinator garden with benches for viewing and contemplation. The containers now hold hosta and hydrangea adding to the garden dedicated to the veterans who gave their lives for America's freedom.

Looking Glass Garden Club

Driving near Wacousta, you will find four bridges with flowering planters under the care of the Look-



ing Glass Garden Club. Come back in winter and the planters hold garlands with red bows! In spring, daffodil blooms abound through the township as daffodil bulbs have been planted for years by club members. Notice the trees surrounding the Looking Glass river and nearby lands as the club has partnered with many other volunteer groups of all ages to reforest the nearby Looking Glass watershed. Our War Memorial garden in Wacousta cemetery has a Blue Star Memorial By-Way plaque that was dedicated in 2021.

Marshall Area Garden Club



Entering from the east end of Marshall, you will find Carver Park. The Marshall Area Garden club(MAGC) designed the Carver Park gardens to be accessible to everyone. The park sidewalk leads to a curving walkway that has stunning beds on either side filled with perennials, annuals, shrubs and trees. This beautification project by the MAGC has resulted in the increased use of this city park! While in in park, you may visit the the garden surrounding the Blue Star By-Way marker that was dedicated recently. Driving through the downtown area it's hard not to notice

the flowering urns that are updated seasonally. Approaching the city from the west, there are six median gardens that were redesigned in 2017. They create a beautiful welcome to this historic town. Recently, over 700 daffodil bulbs were planted throughout these gardens and their bright splash of color this spring was much enjoyed.

US Post office garden is unusual as it's design features large ledge rocks. The many American Liberty Elms planted in the city reflect this club's collaboration with other volunteer groups and the city.

Mason Sycamore Creek Garden Club



As you enter downtown Mason, large flower pots are spilling with bright flowers that are maintained by the Mason Sycamore Creek Garden Club (MSCGC). The flower beds at the Historical museum of the Blue Star Memorial downtown along with Maple Grove Cemetery's Veteran and Gold Star Memorial all showcase the club's efforts. However, the centerpiece is the historic Pink Schoolhouse (1854) located on Ash Street. (Yes, it really is pink!) The gardens surrounding the schoolhouse are tended by MSCGC. Behind the Pink Schoolhouse, is the Sunflower House Learning Center. Here club members have a com-

munity outreach garden program for youths in 2nd through 6th grade. Seed-to-table gardening is taught along with lessons in horticulture, environmental conservation and community beautification. There are vegetable, native plants, herbs and edible flowers and cutting flower gardens to enjoy!

Meridian Garden Club



Central Park Drive is the road that unifies the gardens of the Meridian Garden Club(MGC). Starting on the west end are the plantings of the Firehouse, US Post Office, and the Administration buildings with the Blue Star Memorial; all enhanced with seasonal flowers. Near the Administration buildings is picturesque Central Park, home to the Meridian Historical Village where MGC maintains the gardens. The Grettenberger Farm House with its picket fence has a lovely front perennial area along with a vegetable, fruit and herb garden in back. Harvested produce is given to local food pantries. These gardens are used as

teaching tools for school children in four nearby districts, as well as hosting summer campers and a Civil War enactment. Wander and enjoy the gardens around the Chapel, Gazebo, and the General store. Don't miss the newly redone Twohy pollinator garden and the nationally recognized Plant It Pink garden overlooking the pond!

Sherwood Garden Club



The Sherwood Garden Club members beautify Union City's north and south entrances along with it's downtown area by planting and maintaining colorful flower pots. Be sure to slow down and appreciate their efforts or even take a stroll through town.

Webberville Garden Club




Traveling along Grand River through downtown Webberville, you will find beautiful flower boxes placed by the Webberville Garden Club. You don't want to miss the Blue Star Garden and Gazebo area just before you get to the stop light in town!

Williamston Red Cedar Garden Club



The city of Williamston is well known for its antique stores, restaurants, friendly atmosphere, and beautiful flowers all over the city. For 97 years Williamston Red Cedar Garden Club (WRCGC) plays the most important role in beautifying this historic town. From the City Hall, downtown planters, and gazebo to the Post Office gardens, all eight beautification projects have been the work of love for WRCGC members. The WRCGC latest installation is 1,500 daffodil bulbs planted in a drift in the city park – a sight to behold. The gazebo and educational Butterfly Garden are the community's favorite places to visit and to take photos. When club members are out maintaining a garden and community members often stop by to express their appreciation for the club. This is the best reward for any gardener!

Secret Gardens of Greater Lansing



The **Circle Garden** in Howell was created by Lynn O'Shaughnessy following a 100 □ foot diameter geometric design. It is composed of native Michigan plants for pollinators and is available for tours by appointment only (Lynn, <u>freespirit@pleurothallids.com</u> or 810-599-3115). Be sure to bring your camera!

Frances Park - Stroll through the formal rose garden, the woodland trail or view the Grand River. 5 varieties of roses are in this garden, which is regularly recognized by the All-American Rose Setections organization for outstanding rose garden maintenance. The Frances Park loop trail is 1.4 miles and is great for birding, hiking and trail running. It features a river and is good for all skill levels. It is located at 2701 Moores River Drive, Lansing, MI 48911. (517) 483-4277.

The **St Francis Retreat Center** is located just north of Lansing at 703 E Main St, DeWitt. It is a peaceful 95 acre property that houses not only the retreat buildings but 17 beautiful gardens of various compositions and complexities. Tours are available by appointment only. Call 517-669-8321. Also see stfrancis.ws.

The **MSU Student Organic Farm** is located on 15 acres at 3291 College Road, Holt, Mi (contact: msufarm@msu.edu or 517-230-7987). Passive solar greenhouses are complemented by fields and gardens. Additional resources at the farm include an edible forest garden, cut flower garden, bee hives, and a small mushroom production area.

The MSU Horticulture Gardens located at 1066 Bogue Street, East Lansing, are open daily from sunrise to sundown, but keep in mind that parking is free after 6 pm or on the weekends and holidays. Much pleasure can be gained from simply strolling through the gardens on your own, but a self guided tour app is available: msu.stqry.app. For Group Tours, call 517-355-5191 ext 1327 or email garden4h@msu.edu. Group tour prices are \$5 per person with a 10 person minimum.

- **4-H Children's Garden** has sections with a variety of themes, including an alphabet of flowers, plants that provide foods to the world, "dinosaur" plants, a child-size maze, and a singing sidewalk.
- **The perennial garden** features the colors, textures and forms of flowering and nonflowering herbaceous perennials, bulbs and ornamental grasses. Ten island beds totaling 6,500 square feet informally display a multitude of diverse perennials, providing color and interest in all seasons.
- The trial gardens occupy the northern third of the 14 acres, adjacent to the Plant & Soil Science Building and the Plant Biology Building. In this area, hundreds of new varieties are grown side by side each year, including annuals, perennials, and vegetables, in beautiful decorative sweeps of color. The varieties are well labeled; in mid- to late-summer, they are evaluated for their performance in mid-Michigan.

The **MSU Radiology Healing Gardens** began in 2000 with the placement of a large copper beech tree and now include waterfalls and greenhouse. The flowers, birds, and waterfalls open the senses of sight, smell, touch, hearing, and even taste. They sooth the senses. Stop by anytime to stroll through the gardens, or contact Beth Clarke, Educational Coordinator for the Department of Radiology, to schedule a visit or arrange a tour (<u>clarkem@msu.edu</u> or 517-884-3233). The gardens are located on the MSU campus at 846 Service Road, East Lansing MI.

The **MSU Beal Botanical Garden** was established in 1873 by Professor William James Beal and is the oldest continuously operated university botanical garden of its kind in the US. It includes more than 2000 different taxa, with a focus on natural plant diversity, economic botany, ecology, and plant conservation, especially in the Great Lakes region. It is an outdoor laboratory for students and warmly welcomes the public to learn about and enjoy plants in a beautiful setting. Located on the MSU campus on West Circle Dr, it is open at all times throughout the year. Parking on campus is free after 6 pm or on the weekends and holidays. To arrange a tour, contact Carolyn Miller, Beal Plant Recorder, 517-884-8486. Her specialty is native plants.

Lake Lansing Park North offers 10 miles of trails for cross-country skiing in the winter, morel hunting in the spring, and hiking at all times. A 2.4 mile loop of the trail system is marked with interpretive signs. The trails and boardwalks provide access to evergreen forests, swamp, marsh, deciduous forest and fields in various stages of succession. Dogs must be kept on a leash. The park opens one half hour before sunrise for pedestrian access and 8:00 am for vehicle access (there is a small fee for parking) at 6260 E. Lake Drive, Haslett, MI 48840. The park closes one half hour after sunset, unless otherwise posted.

Ted Black Woods is filled with beautiful hardwoods, an abundance of spring wildflowers and a large diversity of songbirds. You can access this Okemos park from two different points with small parking lots; one is at 4714 Van Atta Road and the other is at 540 Grand River Avenue, Okemos. The trails are favorites for local dog walkers and for observing wetlands wildlife.

The Lansing River Trail rolls through waterfront parks on the Grand River from Moores Park in the west to Dietrich Park in the north. It follows the Red Cedar River from Elm Park to Michigan State University in the east. A branch along the woodsy Sycamore Creek tributary goes south to Maguire Park, where it joins the Sycamore Trail. Another trail branch from Maguire Park heads west on a utility right-of-way to South Waverly Road. An orphaned trail section heads north along Waverly Road back to the Grand River and Frances Park. Altogether, over 20 miles of paved trail pass through numerous parks and natural areas, as well as Downtown Lansing. Many sites are available to park; the paved trail is used by many for bicycling or dog-waking.

Fenner Nature Center is an environmental education center encompassing 134 acres of publicly accessible green space, located at 2020 E. Mount Hope Avenue in Lansing. The property includes over four miles of trails, rolling glacial eskers, towering maple groves and more. Inside the Visitor Center, you will find collections of live native reptiles and amphibians; a viewing area to watch songbirds, deer and wild turkeys. The Visitor Center (517-483-4224) is open Tues-Fri noon-6 pm and Sat-Sun 9 am – 3 pm. The Fenner Nature Center sponsors an apple butter festival in the fall, featuring demonstations of heritage arts and crafts.

The Harris Nature Center (3998 Van Atta Road, Okemos) has multiuse trails that can be enjoyed on foot, bike, snowshoes or cross-country skis. You can even experience the trails with your dog or on horseback. The trails near the Red Cedar River may occasionally be flooded, so use caution when exploring the park. Trails are open every day from dawn until dusk.

Snowshoe rentals (\$10/hour/person) are available at the Harris Nature Center Tuesdays through Saturdays from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm. Rentals are dependent on snow cover, so call ahead at 517.349.3866 to check trail conditions and to reserve snowshoes.

Westcroft is the oldest family owned and operated farm in the state established on July 6, 1776 and currently owned by the 7th generation. It is a plant nursery specializing in azaleas and rhododendrons. Take a walk through the beautiful

four-acre botanical garden featuring their many varieties of azaleas and rhododendrons including hybrids created at Westcroft by former owner Ernest Stanton. An additional 13 acres of woods are decorated for Halloween Hayrides. www.westcroftgardens.com



Matthaei Botanical Gardens 1800 N. Dixboro Rd, Ann Arbor, MI 48105

Black Swallowtail Bill: HB5642

Sponsors of HB5642, Rep. Julie Brixie, (D) 69th District House Representative and Rep. James Lily (R)89th District House Representative were joined by: Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. President and members of the Executive Board, Meridian Garden Club members, and the 3rd and 4th Graders of the Okemos Public Montessori at Central.

March 17, 2022 was lucky for the Irish and Michigan House Bill 5642 (HB5642) which would designate the Black Swallowtail butterfly as the official butterfly for the great state of Michigan.

Under the tenure of Michigan Garden Club President, Marilyn MacIntosh, a Committee of Butterfly experts was formed to research and recommend an official Michigan Garden Club Butterfly. After much research and discussion, the committee recommended the Black Swallowtail. The selection was subsequently ratified by the members. Michigan Garden Clubs sought sponsors to promote the Black Swallowtail as the official State of Michigan butterfly thereby giving notice and image to the importance of pollinators, the fragility of butterflies, and our mission to protect our environment.

Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. (MGC) has worked diligently since March 2016. Senate Bill 850 (SB850) was introduced supporting the Black Swallowtail butterfly as the official state representative of all pollinators. No action was taken by the Senate before the 2015-2016 session ended, therefore the bill died. Subsequent senate bills were introduced in 2017 (SB298) and in 2019 (SB167) which met the same fate.



In March 2019, HB 4314 was introduced and like its predecessors it was assigned to the Government Operations Committee. Again, it did not get a hearing before session ended.

Past-President Janet Hickman wrote letters in support of SB167 and HB4314. More recently, Janet wrote to Rep. Julie Brixie (D) 69th House District encouraging reintroduction of a bill that would name the Black Swallowtail butterfly as our official butterfly. On December 14, 2021, Rep. Brixie introduced HB 5642 with Rep. James Lilly (R) 89th District as co-sponsor. This time the bill was assigned to the Natural Resources and Outdoor Recreation Committee. Perseverance paid off!

Monica Taylor, Michigan Garden Clubs (MGC) President and Jeanette Meyer, MGC Legislative Chair testified at the hearing in support of the bill. Also, Sue Leahy, previous MGC Legislative chair, testified on behalf of the Meridian Garden Club in support of the bill. As you can see from the picture submitted by Sue Leahy, several members of MGC were present for the hearing to provide support.

The fourth graders of the Okemos Central Montessori School pointed out to the committee, Michigan is one of two states without an official butterfly and asked that we not be the last! lowa is the other state without a butterfly. As a committee member pointed out, "lowa beat Michigan for the Big 10 basketball championship. Let's not let them beat us in naming an official state butterfly!"

I have been in contact with Rep. Brixie's staff following the hearing. They tell me that it is very important that we keep our letters of support going to the Natural Resources and Outdoor Recreation committee members, especially Republican committee members and its chair, Rep. Howell. I have provided your District Director's with letters and contact information for the committee members. Also, you will find a sample letter and contact information for the committee members as PDF files on the MGC legislative site www.migardenclubs.org. Rep. Brixie's staff have pointed out that it is incredibly important that we continue to remind the committee members of the importance of HB5642 as the Black Swallowtail butterfly is a perfect representative of pollinators that are so necessary for Michigan crops.

District 2B Interest Groups Benefits, Guidelines and Expectations

History of Interest Groups

The first District 2B Steering Committee was established in the fall of 2017 when no volunteer was found to follow Lynda Foster as District Director (DD). At the fall district meeting, Sue Wittick (Meridian GC) asked for volunteers to lead the district as a group. Peggy Bryson (Meridian GC), Lynn Keelan (Howell GC), and Barb Ketchum (Mason GC) all met and decided to divide the position with each one taking some of the responsibility. Lynn agreed to serve as DD on the Board of Directors of Michigan Garden Clubs (MGC) and to be the district's official spokesperson. Peggy agreed to be treasurer, Barb assumed the role of event coordinator, and Sue was in charge of communications and fund raising. They established the District 2B Steering Committee which met monthly for planning meetings that were open to any 2B member.

Leadership:

- **2B Designers** is led by Lois Snover-Hanson (Meridian GC) covering programs and flower shows and Kathi Dominguez (DeWitt Millennium GC) covering administration and communication).
- **2B Photographers** was established and initially led by Sue Wittick. Currently the group is led by Melinda Pope (Meridian GC).
- **2B Crafters** was established and initially led by Sue Wittick. Currently the group is led by Deb Plichta (Looking Glass GC).
- **2B Quilters** was established and continues to be led by Linda Mogyoros (Meridian GC).
- **2B Youth Gardeners** was established by Sue Wittick. Simar Pawar (Meridian GC), Ronnie Dush (DeWitt Millennium GC), and Sharon Rodgers (Mason GC) have all served as leaders of that interest group.

The First 2B Interest Group

- **2B Designers** began meeting in 2008 to stimulate an interest in floral design and to give participants an opportunity to learn about and practice creating a variety of design types.
- The members became the basic planning committee for all the district flower shows.
- Members chose the name "2B Designers" and decided to meet four times a year, a plan that has continued to this day.





District 2B Interest Groups Benefits, Guidelines and Expectations

Benefits:

- Sharing ideas and gain new skills beyond the scope of the local club.
- Environments for disseminating knowledge so all participants learn new techniques and skills.
- New friendships and connections between clubs.
- Ideas that members can implement in their local clubs.
- Examples of how any area of interest can support fund-raising for the district or clubs.
- Increased awareness of, and pride in the district.
- Educational outreach to communities.
- Activities to attract potential new garden club members.
- Opportunities for leadership.

Guidelines:

- Each interest group is free to organize themselves any way that makes sense to them.
- Members can decide when and how often if they want to physically meet.
- They might limit their interaction to email (difficult though, when some members might not have an email address.)
- They might help out at each other's events.
- They might develop their own newsletter, Facebook page, or blog to share ideas.

Expectations:

- Group leader(s) will contact members on a regular basis.
- Activities will be reported in the district newsletter.
- Effort will be made to find participants from every club.
- Events will rotate to locations around the district.
- Meetings will generally be held in locations central to the district.
- All club members will be invited to attend interest group events.
- Groups will consider offering educational events to the public.
- Groups will consider ways to use their interest and skills to help the district and clubs in fundraising. The district will be asked to cover expenses related to raising funds for the district.
- Any expenses related to a activity of an interest group, are paid by the members participating in that activity. Current membership in a 2B garden club is the only requirement for participation.
- With no stress and no pressure, the groups strive to provide additional enjoyable experiences for garden club members.

Look to the website to see if there are offerings that interest you. Some are formal offerings designed by National Garden Club, Inc. (NGC) while others are less formal, such as the Morning Meetings sponsored by MGC. To find the more formal offerings, go to the Education tab on the MGC website, https://migardenclubs.org. The High School Essay Contest and The Youth Sculpture Contest

The High School Essay Contest is open to grades 9-12. Students submit an essay on one of two topics found on MGC's website under Youth Contests. The topics are always about the environment or topics important to MGC. The first place in all 7 Districts is \$100, the first place overall winner in the State is \$300.

The Youth Sculpture Contest is open to grade 4-8. Youth submit 2 or 3 pictures of a sculpture they have created with recycled or repurposed materials along with their description of what they were creating. The purpose of the contest is to make kids aware of the importance of recycling and keeping our planet green. First place in all 7 Districts is \$25, first place overall in the State is \$50.
