The Howell Garden Club



Once there was this weedy, messy, decrepit corner of the county that temporarily housed young kids to keep them safe from domestic harm and even from themselves. A falling down fence, a bird feeder, some yew shrubs, and an outdoor barbeque grill graced the yard along with a neighbor's very mature and always loaded Black Walnut tree. This youth Connection home was the recipient of Howell Garden Club's Christmas donation one year. Upon visiting the premises, several members saw the potential for a garden project that might even involve youth cooperation. Permission was given for us to "Fluff the Gardens."

We went to work planning, pulling, raking, discarding, begging, rototilling and prettying up this forlorn wasteland. Kyle, joined the club and put a small patio in the back yard, brought a table and chairs for the front porch, and then added perennials and shrubs to our endeavor. Lowes partnered with us, and volunteers came, tore the fence down, put up a higher, more private, maintenance free white fence, built a picnic table, repaired a broken window pane, installed outdoor carpeting on the front porch and complimented US on our efforts. Hostas, Hydrangeas, shrubs,



more perennials, and eventually a butterfly/pollinator garden/ transformed the little plot into an appealing and welcoming oasis located in the middle of Swann Ct. Counselors and kids and parents could spill out to the yard and sit at the table with an umbrella for shade. The lawn, fertilized and weed treated, grew into something lovely. There was room now to sit on the front porch under a pretty floral wreath to chat, play games, or work out some problems. A container of flowers on each side of the entrance walk greets visitors and residents.

Our first "Flower House" continues as a project in progress with additions and seasonal spruce ups along with watering, weeding, and "fluffing" done by the Civic Gardens committee, without which the garden would fail and fall back into ruin. We are the keys that nurture this little oasis of beauty for kids, families, care givers, and administrators to partake of a colorful. scented garden.

Then another "club project" rose on the horizon! Blue Star Memorial had been knocking, but we weren't answering. Mary Ann Farrell finally answered the door, geared up to raise money for the plaque, surveyed the club as to its placement site, appeared before city council to petition permission, and inspired participation. An island in the middle of city hall parking lot with some junky straggly juniper bushes was given to us along with a large boulder for the plague. A new campaign of begging, borrowing, harassing, scratching, laughing, amending, planting, giggling, and fertilizing began as we "fluffed" the island and big containers approaching the building. A community member volunteered to drill holes in the rock and hang the memorial plague. From there we put in Russian Sage, daisies, transplanted peonies and daylillies, common iris, bearded iris, Siberian iris, sedum, milkweed, and myriad other perennials dotted with some annuals too.



In honor of Faith Maurier, Mary Wilkinson, and Lou VanCuyl, a garden table, two chairs, and a bench were placed to in view of hosta and hydrangea containers in the Blue Star garden. Three donated containers appeared along the wall by the stairs. Suddenly everyone was commenting and asking about... continued on page 8...

District IIB fundraising has been very successful this year. Thanks to everyone who has made a donation to the District or has purchased a t-shirt, pollinator pin, pot ornament, note cards, silent auction item, or violet/violet pot! Those purchases have funded acquisition of a laser printer, a photo display stand (for the photo exhibits that can now be part of our flower shows), a microphone and amplifier, and a plant label maker. The printer will let us help clubs save printing costs compared to commercial printers. (Contact Sue Wittick to discuss your printing needs.) The amplifier and mic and the display stand are available for clubs to borrow (contact Sue Wittick). Plant labels (these have durable stakes) are a great educational addition

Thanks to District meeting sales and a hefty donation from ShowSpan, there remains money available for additional purchases and/or community project grants. We've proposed the purchase of a canopy for outdoor events or a wireless projector, both of which would be available for use by clubs. Volunteers Needed for District Leadership!



This is an message for all IIB members. According to MGC procedures, we need to name a new IIB Director ASAP and then a new IIB Steering Committee to assume responsibility for running our district by June 1, 2019. Sue Wittick has been working with the MGC Nominating Committee and we thought the best plan was to find our own replacements.

The model of a district run by a Steering Committee instead of a single individual as director, seems to have worked well for IIB. With 4 people sharing the responsibilities, we have been able to accomplish more and generate new interest and enthusiasm. In fact, several other districts are planning to implement a similar model!

Although an member may assume several of these roles in any combination, they are all listed here individually for clarity. The Steering Committee could be formulated in different ways to meet the needs of the new district leaders, but the tasks deemed of central importance are labeled "SC" for Steering Committee.

- District Director (SC)—serves on the MGC Board of Directors, communicates with other District Directors, and is the official channel of communication between MGC and District IIB. Wears an MGC nametag!
 Drafts agendas for Steering Committee meetings. <u>A volunteer needs to be identified before October 1,</u> 2018.
- 2. Treasurer (SC)—handles receipts, write checks, and provides monthly reports to MGC. Please note that this position is much less time-consuming than being treasurer of a garden club!
- 3. Newsletter Editor (SC)—assumes responsibility for the content of the newsletter, seeking submissions, and writing articles.
- 4. Newsletter Publisher—arranges the articles in a newsletter format for dissemination to the membership.
- 5. Communications (SC)—handles e-mail correspondence with the membership.
- 6. Website Administrator (SC)—makes news, forms, and resources readily available by maintaining a website for the district.
- 7. Member Services (SC)—leads the effort to be in regular contact with IIB clubs to determine their needs and offer support. (All SC members regularly communicate with IIB members.)
- 8. Events (SC)—takes the lead in planning district events. Works closely with clubs hosting future IIB District Meetings.
- Many Hands Make LIGHT Work
- 9. Secretary (SC)—provides a record of decisions made at Steering Committee meetings. This role could be easily shared with other responsibilities.
- 10. Graphics/design/printing—houses the district's laser printer and garden sign printer. Designs and prints materials for use by the district. May provide print services to clubs for special needs.
- 11. Fundraising—suggests possible projects to the SC and implements those approved.
- 12. Leader for an Interest Group—organizes meetings and events for a specific interest group, utilizing the resources within the group whenever possible. We are **CURRENTLY** seeking leaders for the Crafters and Youth Gardening groups. A Landscape Design group has also been suggested and will need a leader.
- 13. Awards Chair—provides information to clubs and individuals regarding available district, state, national, and regional awards, working with the MGC Awards Chair. Keeps track of awards won by clubs and individuals in Dis-

- 14. Outreach Coordinator—works to develop new garden clubs within our district. Follows up on leads from Steering Committee members. This person could recruit a committee. Note: The IIB brochure now available on the website may prove useful for this function. Position currently VACANT.
- 15. Facebook Administrator—possible future social media connection if enough interest is demonstrated.
- 16. Chair for Environmental Studies School—reserved for District IIB beginning in 2020. A possible site and speakers have been identified. This chair would work with the MGC 3rd Vice-President in charge of Schools. Position currently VACANT.
- 17. Treasurer for above Environmental Studies School—would work closely with the chair. Position currently VACANT.
- 18. Historian—keeps a record of awards, officers, and accomplishments for the district. Position currently **VACANT**.





IIB Photographers Interest Group

This group is preparing for photo competition at the October 25th district meeting in Howell. This display will be a "trial run" following the rules from the NGC *Handbook for Flower Shows*. A second photography exhibit will be included in the District IIB Gourmet Gardening Flower Show in March at the MSU Pavilion. Black-matted 5x7" and 8x10" photos will be included on a large display that was purchased by the district. Schedules for both exhibits can be found on the District IIB website.

In preparation for these exhibits, IIB Photographers (IIB-P) are studying the types of photographs required by the various classes in the show. In June, the focus was on ways to avoid motion blur and each member was challenged to bring in one "best picture" where any method discussed had been used. The winner of that challenge was Lynn Keelan, for her photo of cattails swaying in the breeze.

In July, our educational focus was on floral portraits and photographing small critters in the garden, so the challenge is to bring one "best picture" for each of those topics to the August 22nd meeting.


