

Our club is very active with a variety of committees and projects. We take care of 10 public gardens in Meridian Township. The newest, the Plant-it Pink-Garden, was dedicated in October 2017 and was awarded first place for Community Gardens by the National Garden Clubs this year.

The Back Door Gardeners work with hundreds of local school children teaching them where food really comes from and how to plant, tend and harvest fruits and vegetables. This summer the club was awarded over \$250.00 worth of gardening implements from Ames Tools through a National Garden Clubs partnership. Those tools have already been put to good use by the students. They need tools in their hands to stay more engaged. The club and its youth programs will be featured in the upcoming winter edition of the National Gardener.



Creek Garden Club hosted the meeting and provided the presentation on their Sunflower Learning



IIB Designers

The next meeting will be on February 20th, 10 am—noon at the Michigan Nature Association in Okemos when we will experience freedom of style for a Botanical Arts-Design class called "Anything Goes."







This new section is designed to answer your questions about IIB, MGC, CR, NGC, or anything related to what we do in our clubs or gardens. If we can't locate an answer to your questions, we will put it out to the membership.

If you have a Q, we'll find an A!

Q—How much should I be fertilizing my houseplants in the winter?

A— Houseplants, like people, need food to perform, especially when they are actively growing. Spring and summer are necessary feeding months; however during the winter, feeding is not necessary. If you do fertilize, do it sparingly. Dilute the fertilizer by 50 percent or more.

Q—When will the District IIB Environmental Studies School begin?

A—Probably in the spring of 2021. There are four 2-day courses, offered in the fall and spring for two years. You can contact Ron Overton, chair, for information or to volunteer to help with the planning. overtonron@wowway.com, 517-626-7269.

Q—I'd like to help District IIB but I don't want to attend any more meetings. Are there some tasks I can do from home?

A—Much of the effort to support our district can be done from home! You might consider being Awards Chair to keep track of district, state, regional, and national award categories and answer questions for IIB clubs. You could keep a running record of the awards won by IIB clubs.

A—IIB could use a **historian** to keep track of events and accomplishments. Our records are currently minimal for district meetings, district directors, life memberships, etc.

A—You could help with **communication**—maintaining group mailing lists by club to send announcements, newsletters, etc.

A—You could help the **newsletter** publisher by gathering information and pictures to cover club events, writing articles, or editing drafts.

A—You could volunteer to be the district's **Grants** Chair, doing research on available funding and providing information about possibilities to clubs.

A—You could run a "trading post" for the district newsletter, sort of a clearing house for people who have an abundance of something to share or people who are looking for something in particular. (e.g. divided iris ready to share; looking for ground cover and willing to dig, etc.)

Q—Does Michigan Garden Clubs, inc. have a **membership brochure**?

A—Yes, and it's a lovely one that's ready for printing from the MGC website. Click here.

Q—Is it true that NGC now supports a floral design where you can paint fresh flowers?

A—You bet! That new **design** is called **Exploration** and it's in the Botanical Arts portion of a flower show schedule. Some plant material must be used but there is no restriction on what can be done to the plant material in this class.





The schedule for our *Kids in Toyland* is available on the IIB website. It will be held on December 5th at the Best Western Hotel in Okemos. Please find some kids to work with, and let them get hooked on horticulture and design! Although most of the classes are for youth, there are three Botanical Arts classes for adults. The openings in all youth classes and adult Class 1 are unlimited.



Schedules for our March, 2019 *Gourmet Gardening* flower show are available on the IIB website. All the Design, Botanical Arts Crafts, and Botanical Arts Photography classes for the March 2019 District IIB Flower Show require preregistration. Classes are limited to 4 entries in each one and the Flower Show Schedule identifies a consultant to contact for each class. Pre-registration is not needed for most horticulture classes.
