# Garden Club of Greater Lansing

The Garden Club of Greater Lansing (GCGL) was founded in 1931 as the Lansing Branch of the Women's National Farm and Garden Club. GCGL joined the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan, Inc. in December 1933. Since its inception, it has been involved in the Lansing community as well as in state garden club activities and events. One of our former members was President of the National Council of State Garden Clubs (now NGC), and past Central Regional Director. Numerous members have served on boards and committees of NGC, MGC, and District IIB. Our membership frequently has included accredited and master flower show judges. As the oldest garden club in the Lansing area, GCGL has evolved as the city and greater Lansing community have grown and changed. Our active members all participate in a variety of committees and activities.





The GCGL mission is "to provide horticultural and educational

resources, and networking opportunities for members; to promote the love of gardening, floral and landscape design, and to promote civic and environmental responsibility."



Our largest and oldest program is the Greens Market, which was started in 1934. Fresh greens are made into decorated wreaths, swags, boxwood trees and arrangements and are offered to the public on the first Saturday of December.

Another long standing program is the Corn Project which was founded in 1979. This program teaches kindergarten and first graders in area schools about planting and nurturing seeds and how plants grow. In the spring of 2018 the Corn Project served over 3800 students from 33 area schools. Club members distribute pots with soil, seed and instructions for planting. With teacher supervision, the students learn to plant seeds and to promote plant growth. They also take home seeds with instructions for planting and care.

GCGL meets on the second Monday of each month. We also take field trips to visit area activities that support member interests. Members participate in a wide variety of programs and civic projects, including Arbor Day, the Blue Star Memorial Plaque Garden in Frances Park, District IIB Flower Show, Greens Market, Junior Gardening, Festival of the Trees, Be a Visitor in your Own Home Town and Neighborhood Beautification which recognizes outstanding gardens in the community.

Communication with members and the community include our Yearbook and Twigs, the Club Newsletter; Facebook; and the Website. Every new member is given a "green book' which is a loose-leaf notebook with more detailed information about committees and activities, Club Constitution and Bylaws, greens preparation for use, and other helpful information.

We continue to enjoy our programs and our friendships. New members are welcome as we work and learn together.

The MGC Board of Directors recently approved a change to its rule on distribution of surplus funds from events and meetings. While surplus revenue from schools and conventions remains distributed at 50% to MGC and 25% each to host club and District, the split for District and leadership meetings now is 50% to the District and 25% each to host club and MGC. That means that more funds could be available at the

District level for distribution to clubs in the form of community project grants.

While District IIB's current budget did not include funds for grants in 2018-19, there are now sufficient funds available to make small grants, and the steering committee is already planning to provide for grant funding in the 2019-20 budget. So if your club is undertaking a community project that could use some extra funding, check out the guidelines for these grants and consider applying for one.


#### Barb Ketchum, Member Services, Events

### IIB Desígners Interest Group



# **Invasive Species Alert**

# Black Swallow-wort

# or Dog-strangling Vine

Cynanchum Iouiseae (Vincetoxicum nigrum) \*Detected in Michigan\*

#### Identification:

- An herbaceous, perennial vine growing up to 7 feet in length
- Leaves are shiny dark-green and oval to heart-shaped with a pointed tip
- Small, star-shaped flowers are dark purple with 5-petals and grow in clusters of 6-10 blooms
- Seed pods are milkweed-like and full of flat, brown seeds covered in fine, white hairs

Habitat: Black swallow-wort vines thrive in both shade and sun and are found in disturbed areas along roadsides, pastures, old fields and gardens as well as alvar and along fens.

Native Range: Southwestern and Northern Europe

**U.S. Distribution:** From the Atlantic coast to the Midwest and as far south as Kentucky and Missouri. Also present in Quebec and Ontario.

**Local Concern:** Black swallow-wort grows rapidly and can cover other vegetation. Seeds are carried on the wind or transported by water. Roots are toxic to mammals, including livestock. Plants are toxic to many insect larvae including monarch caterpillars.
