and other birds and animals which use our pond to feed all year round.






I have been a volunteer for EVE, Inc. (End Violent Encounters) for over 20 years and have served on their board.

Ingredients:	
3 cups old-fashioned oats 1 cup mixed nuts 1/2 cup pumpkin seeds (or any other seeds or nuts) 1/2 slivered almonds 1 cup dried cranberries or raisins or combination! 1 14 oz. can sweetened condensed milk	
Directions:	
1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.	



- 2. Line a 9 x 13 pan with parchment paper, lightly sprayed with non-stick spray
- 3. Mix all ingredients together in a bowl and spread into prepared pan, evenly pressing.
- 4. Bake for 20-25 minutes until edges are golden brown.
- 5. Allow to cool for 5 minutes in pan, before using parchment to lift from pan. Use a

## Lansing Home and Garden Show Report

Staffing a big show takes many volunteers. This was the case at the Lansing Home and Garden Show, March 14-17, 2019 at booth 3003.

Our efforts to make the Black Swallowtail our Michigan state butterfly gathered 420 signatures of support for our new Senate bill (SB 167)! The public was very enthusiastic. Some folks even remembered us from last year and remarked, "Isn't this done yet?"





Our friendly staffers took time to talk with the public and answer questions. They distributed hundreds of educational brochures and plant "shopping lists" of host plants and nectar plants to attract butterflies.
