"Tea in the Garden" is this year's theme of the Christmas tree decorated by **Across the Fence Post Garden Club** members for the Turner-Dodge House Christmas tree extravaganza. The tree was decorated in pink and green with dried Allium cristophii 'Giganteum' and 'Purple Sensation', Artemisia ludoviciana 'Silver Queen', Hydrangea paniculata 'Limelight' and 'Bobo', Hydrangea arborescens 'Annabelle', Salix matsudana 'Tortuosa' "Curly Willow", Chasmanthium latifolium 'Northern Sea Oats' and Vitis vinifera 'Grapevine.' Also on the tree were tea cups with attached saucers, clothes pinned to the branches, and pink and lime green/white polka dot ribbons running the height of the tree. Clear lights, silver bulbs and pink fans finish the design. This is the fourth year the club has decorated a tree at Turner-Dodge with a different theme each year. Last year we were voted "favorite tree" by visitors and awarded a check.
