One of Michigan Garden Clubs' primary projects, for the next two years, is promoting **Pollinator Gardens**. Our activities at MGC and the local clubs all align with this overall initiative. While much has been done to promote awareness of the importance of all pollinators to the overall health of our eco-system and to Michigan's agriculture/floriculture industry,



it is incumbent on each and every one of us to stand up and **BEE counted** for recognizing and acting upon the fundamental importance of pollinators and what each of us CAN do, as individuals, to provide pollinator habitat, preserving and protecting one of our most important natural resources.

We can have an impact when we teach not only our youth about pollinators, but also our communities, and our legislators. DeWitt Millennium Garden Club, Inc. did that in November. **Schroeder Homes** has had a 15 acres Wildflower Meadow Pollinator Garden, only a few blocks from downtown, for several years. Residents drove by it daily, but never gave it too much thought, as it changed colors from yellow, to lavender, and to blue, and to white, depending on what plant was blossoming at the time. Just another garden among the 9 areas on Bridge Street that DMGC tends each year.

National and State Garden Clubs' attention to the restoration of the declining population of pollinators in the world and the pollinator sign, designed for Carol Brodbeck's service as MGC Past President, reminded DMGC that we had a wonderful garden project right there in our area which we could get registered in the Million Pollinator Garden Challenge. Schroeder Builders registered this wonderful garden and DMGC presented them with a Certificate of Appreciation and 3 pollinator signs, to go next to their street signs, in a little ceremony at the offices. What a pleasant experience for everyone!

Schroeder's efforts now have a huge potential to make a lasting difference and fundamental change in how the public, and they, themselves, think about pollinators and connect them with the health of our environment. They have invited the public to walk the paths and enjoy the meadow.

DMGC appreciates the huge and spectacular pollinator gardens, which surround the entire beautiful subdivision properties on Bridge, Geneva and Herbison Streets. We thank them for their environmental forethought and registering of the garden.

All non-club members may register their pollinator gardens. Help a friend register and report it to your president or officer responsible for the count in the president's report. It is interesting to see who is registered. I found General Motors' Delta Township pollinator garden registered with NGC. Who would have thought?!

Class 107 How Did They Do That?

Professional class for wreaths, swags, garlands, or a design from classes 108-112 below.

Class 108 Lovely Distractions

Corsages, bridal bouquets, hair pieces, and other personal adornments.

Class 109 Warming up the Audience

A design in a small cup or small container, in any style. No more than 8" height, width, or depth.

Class 110 Natural Delights

A creative line design incorporating wood. Not to exceed 16" in height, width, or depth.

Class 111 Abracadabra

A creative tubular design having dominant cylindrical forms throughout, composed of any materials. Plant material and other optional components complete the design. Design not to exceed 14" in height, width, or depth.

Class 112 Making Mysteries

A creative transparency design with see-through elements (translucent, diaphanous, grid-like materials) integral to the design and permitting some components to be viewed through others. Design not to exceed 12" in height, width, or depth.

Note: Designers must register for the following classes. Only the first four entries for each class will be accepted.

Class 113 Oohs and Aahs

A cascade design staged in a black niche 36" high and 22" wide (provided by committee.) Design will be placed on a table skirted in black.

Class 114 Leaping Out of the Box

An exhibition table staged on a table skirted in black and fitting into a space 22" wide. Design to be created artistically to suggest the service of food, not functionality. It should include, at a minimum, a plate or bowl, beverage container, and napkin. Plant material, including at least one orchid, must be used as needed for the overall design. A background panel may be used.

Design Rules



- 1. It is helpful if entry tags are completed in advance.
- An Exhibitor may enter as many Classes as desired, but only one exhibit per Class. All design work must be the work of the Exhibitor. Plant material need not be grown by the Exhibitor.
- 3. No artificial flowers, fruit, or foliage are permitted. Lace leaves and ribbon buds are permitted only in Class 108.
- 4. Fresh orchid(s) must be used in every design. If you know the botanical name of the orchid(s) you are using, put the name on the entry card.
- 5. Leaf shine, dye, paint etc. may be used ONLY on dried plant
- 6. All plant material used in the designs should have been cut from a plant. None should be planted in soil.
- 7. An underlay is permitted with all designs. Designs are staged on black skirted tables 28" above the floor.
- 8. American Orchid Society's (AOS) "Certificate of Meritorious Arrangement" may be awarded to an outstanding exhibit in any flower arrangement class. Corsages are also considered arrangements for the purposes of this award. If an exhibitor does not wish to accept the AOS award "Not for AOS judging" MUST be noted on the entry tag. This does not disqualify the item from consideration for a ribbon in its class or the trophy.
- 9. Judges' written comments on the entry tags will remain with the entry until Show closing.
- 10. No entry may be removed from the Show before 4:00 p.m. Sunday, February 23, 2020.

DISTRICT IIB FLOWER SHOW HOSTING DUTIES

PARKING – Parking for HOSTS is in the vendors' lot, which is located on Farm Lane across the road from the **east side** of the Pavilion. Enter through **Door U** and pick up your HOSTESS badge at the **Show Span** desk, just inside the door. <u>Please arrive about ten minutes before your shift begins</u> so that you can get over to the arena, store your belongings and learn any special instructions from the HOSTS who have finished their shift.

IMPORTANCE of HOST BADGE - The Show Span desk at **Door U** has a roster of our Flower Show hosting names, so if you are replacing someone who could not fill their shift, please be ready to give them both your name and who you replaced. The badge states HOSTESS. It does not have your name on it, so please feel free to wear your garden club name badge.

Following your shift, your HOSTESS badge must be returned the Show Span desk at **Door U** before you depart the building. **PLEASE do not** leave the HOSTESS badge in the flower show arena, as the Show Span desk has a limited number of our badges to distribute. Arriving hostesses need to get into the show and over to our flower show arena in time to learn specifics of their host job and before on-duty hosts depart.

DISTRICT IIB - FLOWER SHOW – The flower show is located in the auditorium arena, on the west side of the Pavilion. Ask the Show Span desk for directions to our spot. When you arrive at the arena, go behind the show curtain, up the stairs to the auditorium seating area and sign-in at the host table (red book) under your date/time slot. Ask departing hosts if there are special instructions for you to follow. Please help yourself to water/snacks.

SECURITY – There is no secure area to leave purses, so please lock all valuables in your car. Coats can be stored behind the curtain in the auditorium seating. Keep items such car keys, phone and money in your pocket. Show Span employs security personnel who walk through the show/building so our exhibits and staging will be safe. Show Span employees are positioned at each pavilion entry door and will request to see your exhibitor badge.

JOBS TO DO WHILE OUT ON THE FLOOR – Visitors may ask for a general layout of the show. We have Divisions of Horticultural, Designs, Botanical Arts-Design and Educational Exhibits. All classes are listed in the schedule, which is on the HOST table. Wander through the exhibits to check plants and designs. Please straighten brochures and entry cards. Pick up litter and brush crumbs from entry tables. Answer visitor questions and encourage them to read the judges' comments on backside of design entry cards. At the District IIB Educational Exhibit table there is a book where visitors can leave their contact information should they be interested in joining an MGC garden club. Only provide water to horticulture if there is a note requesting the host to water. Otherwise, the exhibitor is responsible for watering their entry. Children are welcome, so we'll have to watch them closely. Please ask visitors not to touch or disassemble any of the exhibit entries.

AT THE END OF YOUR SHIFT – PLEASE Watch for incoming hostesses. Inform new hostesses of any pertinent information. Fetch your belongings, and then exit through door U, RETURNING YOUR BADGE TO THE SHOW SPAN DESK.

SUSAN BETZ



PAT LINDEMANN

Title: Greening of the Drains

Patrick Lindemann was first elected as the Ingham County Drain Commissioner in 1992, an office he has re-defined to reflect his environmental stewardship ethic and systems approach to stormwater management. He has received international, national, and state recognition and awards for his innovative drain projects.

Two of his award-winning projects, the Tollgate Wetland Stormwater facility in the City of Lansing and Lansing Township; and the Towar Rain Garden Drains in East Lansing and Meridian Township are first-Of-their-kind urban retrofit projects based on Low-Impact Designs (LID) that better protect the environment while saving costs. Drain Commissioner Lindemann is known for finding such win-win solutions. These projects were highlighted in the Clean Water Action publication on American Rivers entitled "The Greening of Stormwater: Michigan Communities—saving money, beautifying neighborhoods and protecting lakes and streams" authored by Dave

Dempsey. Patrick has been named the 2007 "Hero of the Lakes," by Clean Water Action, a national advocacy organization that has over a million members. During his 26 years in Office, he has overseen the construction and maintenance of millions of dollars of drain improvements that have opened the way for hundreds of millions of dollars of new economic growth in Ingham County.

Mr. Lindemann has received many awards for his creative and innovative projects. Organizations such as the Sierra Club, David Dempsey Award for Distinguished Service for the Environment, 2013, Michigan Wildlife Habitat Foundation, Dengal Habitat Award and National Stormwater Congrol program: Excellence Award.



VIRGINIA FROEHLICH

Title: Plants that Will Make you Itch, and Make You Twitch...and Maybe Even Kill You – a humorous, yet informative, look at "plant criminals" we may be harboring in our homes and gardens.

Virginia is very active in the State Gardening community. She is the current Michigan Garden Clubs' Life Membership Chairperson (2015-present), National Garden Clubs Gardening Study, Landscape Design and Environmental Studies Consultant.
