Members were able to keep in touch with monthly Zoom meetings and held a 'Member Tidbits' contest at year end. Five weekly rounds of trying to guess the unknown tidbit of member's personal lives. garden and, when found in the spring....keep on ticking!

Our first 'live' meeting was held in April at the Howell park on the lake with a presentation by **Jim McGrath** of Nature Discovery in Williamston. The photo below is Jim holding a Michigan native stinging nettle plant. Despite being commonly treated as a 'weed' the nettle is more nutritious than most of the greens that we grow intentionally. The sting disappears when it is boiled or sauteed and its tea is used to relieve arthritis. Even more important, the nettle works as the 'nursery' for the Red Admiral, Milbert's Tortoise Shell, Comma and Question Mark Butterflies. (yes, the markings under the wings of the last two look like a comma and question mark!)



Thanks to a recommendation from the District 2B, the Howell Garden Club created their first picture postcards with the club information on the back.
